# Pastor Brad's

# "Ponderings"

*"He (Jesus) himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, having died to sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. <sup>25</sup> For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the Shepherd and Guardian of your souls." – New Testament Letter of 1 Peter 2:24-25*

PONDER WITH ME THE WORDS OF 1 PETER 2:24

On Good Shepherd Sunday, usually the fourth Sunday in Easter, we hear 1 Peter, chapter 2, and we say/sing Psalm 23. We hear about Jesus The Good Shepherd as the preacher makes all the connections. We have been like sheep who have gone astray. We have turned each one of us to his (her) own way. We are called to return to "the shepherd and guardian of our souls," writes Peter in his Letter. Peter knew something of our great need to return to Jesus for forgiveness and new life. We, too, know something of our great need for Jesus the Good Shepherd.

Psalm 23 is a Psalm we know by heart. I shared that Psalm in my office with several members in private pastoral conversations this past week. I love Psalm 23. I love the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd. I have many icons of that Shepherd on my walls. I remember singing Psalm 23 in the Joseph Gelineau version from Trinity Lutheran, Tacoma, WA church's balcony and organ loft with cantors and choral, congregation refrain, played by Dr. David Dahl, PLU's organist emeritus. Perhaps our musicians and I and you can sing it together sometime. There's even a newer contemporary worship song I am learning (piano and bass) based on Psalm 23 by Leanna Crawford, entitled "Still Waters (Psalm 23)." We Christians automatically connect up Psalm 23 to John 10.1-10 where Jesus says, "I am the door of the sheep." "I am the Good Shepherd" who will lay down his life for the sheep. Other Bible verses come to mind as we make our connections between the two Testaments: Jeremiah 23.3ff., Ezekiel 34:23ff., as well as Luke 15.3-7.



*"I will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the countries and bring them back to the fold." [Jeremiah 23.3.] "Behold, I, I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out." [Ezekiel 34.11] "I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed and I will bind up the crippled, and I will strengthen the weak ..." [Ezekiel 34.16]. Behold, I am the Good Shepherd!*

*I want to connect up the "storied images," by using narrative analogy, because I, too, have a deep need to connect my own personal story to the larger biblical story and Jesus' great promises.*

Peter also mentions the wounds of Christ in 1 Peter 2:24. This is the only New Testament reference to the wounds of Christ. In the Old Testament, however, wounds are spoken of often as a description of the human condition. You might read Isaiah 1.5ff; Jeremiah 30.12, 17; Micah 1.8 and Nahum 3.19. Isaiah wrote of the wounds of the One he calls, in his vision/ Oracle/Song, The Servant in chapter 53: "He was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed." -Isaiah 53.5.

We humans need a shepherd. The good shepherd comes to find the lost. Jesus is that Good Shepherd God we so long for. We humans are lost and Jesus comes to find us in our lostness. That's what we confess in our prayers and kyrie confessions of sin at the beginning of worship each weekend worship service. The Good Shepherd has good news for lost people. His words to us are: "I am the Good Shepherd." "I have come to be your Shepherd, you shall not want. [Psalm 23] So join us for worship to hear that good news where we gather around the image of the Good Shepherd, the Guardian of our souls. Let these gospel words "do you good."

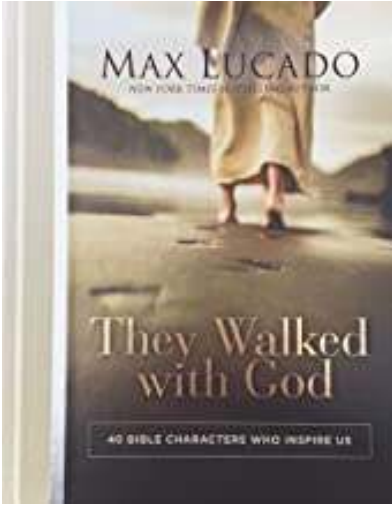


We are diligently working toward the accomplishment of our reaccreditation tasks for the National Association for the Education of Young Children, (NAEYC). Our site visit window is currently set to be from December 1st, 2024—May 15, 2025, but will narrow as the time for our visit approaches. Reaccreditation includes the completion of Classroom Portfolios and the Program Portfolio, as well as preparation for classroom and program observations. Additional tasks include mentoring newer staff with respect to protocol and mandates we are required to adhere to.

There are ten Early Childhood Program Standards.

- ◆ The first five focus on children: relationships, curriculum, teaching, assessment of a child's progress, and health.
- ◆ The remaining five focus on the program: teaching staff, partnerships with families and community, and leadership and administration.

St. Luke Preschool has been accredited by NAEYC and held to these high standards of excellency since 1995!

## Pondering Anew: My Adventures at the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians (ALCM) Conference 2024

I was unable to see much of anything as I arrived in Valparaiso, Indiana, as the town has few streetlights, and I arrived at 9:40pm. While I had originally planned to fly, not one but two days of flights had been canceled due to the Microsoft/Crowdstrike outage. I wasn't sure how many more flights would be canceled going forward, so I took a deep breath, loaded my little 2008 Yaris, and prayed I would make it in time. I did—20 minutes before the deadline to check into the dorms.

When I opened my curtains in the morning, I was pleasantly surprised to be surrounded by lush green grass, large trees, and beautiful brick architecture. I was in awe of the towering stained-glass windows of the Chapel of the Resurrection, probably triple the size of St. Luke's sanctuary.

I truly felt the beauty of the Valparaiso University community when we all sang together each day for morning convocation: the Lutheran Summer Music (LSM) Academy high school students and faculty, around two hundred members of the Association of Lutheran Church Musicians (ALCM), and some Valpo locals. "Luther's Morning Prayer," a hymn by Carl Schalk that was commissioned by LSM in 2009, was the beginning of our daily routine. Only the ALCM members had music in their hands, as the students had sung this every day for a month and had memorized it weeks ago.

On the second morning, I spotted our dear friend and beneficiary of our spring benefit concert Elijah Smith smiling and chatting with his peers. He shared with me his new joy of composing and that a piece of his would be played on a concert that evening. He emailed me the following about his work:

"I got the inspiration from the composer Connor Chee and his piece called Female Rain for piano. I wanted to compose something that is my own like feeling of what female rain is for me as a Navajo."

I wanted it to be very light and flowing or like soft to loud but then come back being the light flowing that female rain is. I didn't want to name it in English so I named it Níítsá.

He explained to me that male rain is a hard, beating, torrential rain, while female rain is gentle and soothing. While he is usually a quiet and reserved individual,

Elijah talked to me more in that one conversation than all the other times we had spoken combined, overflowing with passion. It was clear that LSM was helping him to thrive.

After morning prayer, the adults would split off to ALCM activities. In just three and a half days of the "Ponder Anew: Serving and Leading the Church's Song from Generation to Generation" conference time, there were four workshop sessions; four in-depth learning sessions; eight sight reading sessions to sample choir anthems from different publishers; several mini lectures; and concerts each night. They kept us busy!

It was difficult to choose which topic to see in each session, as there were up to eight options to select from during every time slot. I was thankful to learn that every session would be recorded so I would have the opportunity to view all topics online after the conference ended. I was able to attend a copyright check-in, a percussion practicum, a children's choir catchup, a conducting course, and a deep discussion on avoiding burnout as a professional church musician, among several other sessions. Somehow in between the numerous activities, I was able network with conference members from around the country, fellowshiping with them over dinner and music and trips to and from the hotel—good thing I had my car!

My two days’ drive back to New Mexico allowed me to reflect on just how many ways this Valpo trip had restored me. LSM students and faculty showed me just how much a high-level, inspirational environment can make a difference in young people’s lives. The information in the sessions helped me to broaden my understanding in my work as a church musician and music coordinator. Communal singing in large groups in massive spaces refreshed my love for traditional church music.

Most of all, I was reminded of how truly blessed I am by St. Luke. After I spoke a bit about the music programs and the hard work we’ve done as a congregation even in our time of transition, one of the organists at the conference said to me, “You must have done something extra right to be so blessed to be at a church like that.” Thank you for supporting Elijah Smith this past spring to allow him to go to a wonderful place to grow as a young adult and budding composer, and thank you for supporting me to “Ponder Anew” at Valpo this summer. I look forward to using the new tricks I’ve learned in upcoming rehearsals as we begin the fall season.

## October is National Protect Your Hearing Month

### *Safeguard Your Hearing*

During this year's National Protect Your Hearing Month, observed each October, learn how to protect yourself and your loved ones from noise-induced hearing loss (NIHL).

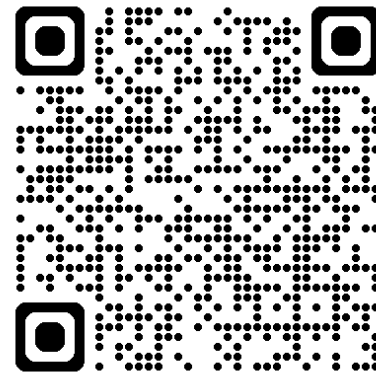
Sounds can harm your hearing when they are too loud and last too long. The louder the sound, the quicker it can damage your hearing.

Noisy Planet and the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders (NIDCD) have created free, shareable resources on why, when, and how to wear hearing protectors to prevent hearing loss from noise.

When you can't turn down the volume or move far enough away from loud sounds, you can use hearing protectors to keep your hearing healthy. The best kind of hearing protectors are the ones you like and will use.

Two types of hearing protective devices-earplugs or protective earmuffs-can help prevent hearing damage. Hearing protectors limit the level of sound. They do not block out all noise. Earplugs fit directly into the ear canal, the narrow passageway between the outer ear and the middle ear. They come in disposable and reusable options and in various sizes. A parent should help young children insert earplugs and make sure they fit properly.

Protective earmuffs are easy-to-use, reusable, plastic cups that reduce noise by completely covering both ears. They come in sizes that fit most people, including infants and children. Earmuffs are easier than earplugs to wear correctly, especially for young children.

Practice safe listening for yourself and for your family by taking these three simple steps:

- ◆ Lower the volume
- ◆ Move away from the noise
- ◆ Wear hearing protectors, such as earplugs or protective earmuffs

The ability to hear well helps kids succeed in school, in sports, and in their personal relationships. Talk with the kids in your life about the causes and prevention of noise-induced hearing loss so that healthy hearing habits become a natural choice early on.

In the last month, the St Luke Strategic Planning Implementation Team (Sally Trigg, Andy Hochstein, Tom Berardinelli, Mary Fidler, and Pamela Franco) met with more active St. Luke Ministry Groups and helped set up some new groups as it continued gathering information for an upcoming Group Booklet. It also finalized a new St Luke Organizational Chart.

Here are some of the exciting new groups:

- The Safety and Security Group helps provide a safe and secure environment on the St. Luke campus for church members, staff, visitors, and preschool staff, students and families. This group is already working on assessing and improving security camera coverage at the church and preschool.
- The Technology Advisory Group responds to technology questions and needs of St Luke Church and Preschool, to provide technical support if possible, and to periodically assess technology needs for Church and Preschool and provide recommendations.
- The Helping Hands Member Support Group helps our members by providing needed support services, such as lawn care, transportation, and meal delivery.
- The New Member and Evangelism Group supports efforts to bring new members to St Luke.
- The Extending God's Table Group delivers communion on a long-term or interim basis to church members who cannot attend services. This group is already delivering communion to homebound members.
- The Holiday Decorations Group helps St Luke welcome holidays by decorating the church.



In addition, the Hospitality Group and the Men's Bible Study are re-forming. The September 22 luncheon is the first effort of the re-formed Hospitality Group.

The St Luke Strategic Planning Implementation Team is gathering information from a few more groups, and Pamela Franco has started developing the St Luke Ministry Group Booklet. Look for this publication, which will include the new St Luke Organization Chart, in upcoming months.

This Group Ministry effort originated in the 2023 St Luke Retreat. Last September, St. Luke pastors, Council, and congregation members met to look at St Luke's past, present, and future. # Global Mission Ministry

Dear friends and partners in mission, School has re-started after the summer break both here in Guyana and in the United States! On the Sunday before the first day of school in Guyana, Pastor Amanda Singh invited the children of Hope Lutheran Church, in the village of Ross, to receive words of encouragement and blessing as she laid her hands on each of their heads and prayed for them. The streets were buzzing with energy and excitement the next day as children reconnected with teachers, friends, and lessons. I pray that you have experienced similar blessings and energy in your congregations and towns at the start of the new school year.

It is not only children who have gone back to school in Guyana, but also adults, especially those identified as leaders by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Guyana (ELCG). Fourteen of them have begun their studies in the Lutheran Lay Academy, which has re-opened after years of inactivity. Helping the ELCG to get the Lay Academy up and running, and establishing it on a firm footing so that it can continue is the main responsibility to which I have been called.

Students in the Lutheran Lay Academy choose one of three tracks to follow: They can prepare to be voluntary lay leaders in the church (a one-year track), deacons (an 18-month track), or pastors (a two-year track). There are two terms each year, and students take two courses per term. Right now, students of all three tracks are exploring Biblical Studies with Pastor Roy Thakurdial, a Guyanese pastor serving a congregation in Canada, and Worship and Liturgy with Pastor Leroy Nicholson, who serves the Ebenezer parish of the ELCG. Pictured are the students in their Worship and Liturgy class. Each course meets once a month online and once a month in person. The photo is of an in-person class, but as you can see, some of the students are online because the class meets simultaneously in two locations: at the church office in New Amsterdam (where I live), and at Calvary Lutheran Church in the capital city, Georgetown. Students attend class at whichever location is most convenient for them.

The students tell me that they are excited about learning new material and learning new ways of thinking about the familiar activities of reading the Bible and worshiping, although there are certainly challenges for them. Some have not been to school in a while, and they

are running to catch up. Others are trying to balance their time between the work they do for a living and their coursework. Any of you who have gone back to school as adults can probably identify with those who face these challenges. The Lutheran Lay Academy Committee that oversees the program is considering ways that we can support the students better in handling these challenges successfully. It is a work in progress.

One thing we have done is set up a little library and study area in each of the locations where the classes meet. I use these resources myself whenever I have a sermon to prepare or a workshop to lead.

As we continue to build up the church by training its leaders, I ask for your prayers for the students, teachers, Lay Academy Committee, and the ELCG, that the Spirit of God would guide the process we are going through together to make it wise and good, healthy and constructive, so that the Lutheran Lay Academy can serve the church for years to come. Many thanks to you for sharing our work in this way.

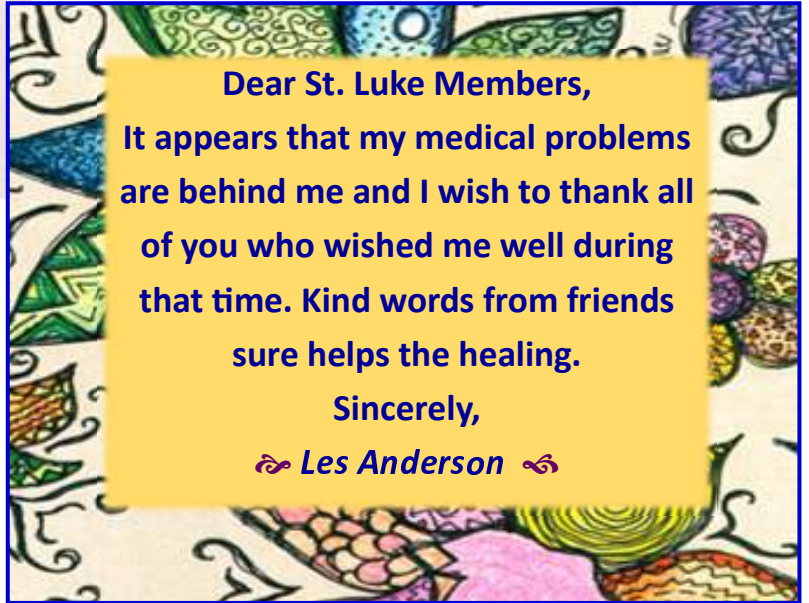

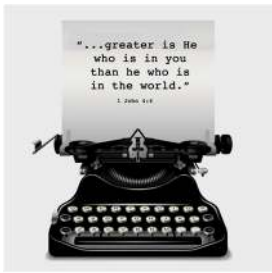


Dear St.Luke Church, July 2024
